### THE HEART FOLLOWS ITS TREASURE

*"For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." Matthew 6:21*

Seventeen years ago, I went to the hospital with chest pains. I could have ignored the symptoms and almost did. But they served as a warning of something serious that needed tending. Yet upon examination, my EKG and blood enzymes were within normal limits and I had no more pain. From all outward appearances, I was fine and ready to go home. It wasn't until a procedure was done to go inward, to actually invade the vessels to my heart and look deeper, that the blockage was found. A relatively minor procedure corrected the problem, but that wasn't all there was to it. I was given a choice---good heart health or bad heart health! The life-giving choice meant that my whole way of life needed to change, from what I ate, to how I exercised, to how I handled stress.

I took those changes to heart, so to speak...for awhile. Then in a very subtle way, the old habits kicked back in. Over the years I've had several other heart cath procedures and a few more minor blockages opened up. My 4 stents give me additional help in keeping my heart safe. But that's not enough. I have to cooperate with the technology if my heart's going to have the opportunity to do its job right. Regular checkups are key because they force me to be honest about my discipline or lack of discipline. Daily repentance is needed.

There's a parable for all of us there. Don't rely on outward examinations only. Go straight and deep into your heart and honestly see how things are. Ask yourself, "Is everything right with God?" Ask God, your spiritual cardiologist, to help you see what's there. And then make the necessary changes, with God's help, to clear the obstacles that prevent the full circulation of the Holy Spirit's flow. This is essential if we want to experience a major change in the way we think, speak and live with Jesus. It's never too late to start over. What I love about our Lord is that he's a God of 2nd chances. Grace rules!

God designs his Church to equip us for service in Jesus' name through the power of the Holy Spirit. The Body of Christ feeds us with heart-healthy spiritual food that helps us grow more and more into mature Christians, while always pointing and directing us to something greater than herself—Jesus. We're nurtured by her sacraments and her holy fellowship of mutual encouragement. Sharing our common life in the Body of Christ keeps us connected to Jesus, the living Vine that nourishes us for our God-given purpose. Apart from the vine, where Jesus' lifeblood flows, we become withering branches that slowly die.

Everyone wants to have their cake and eat it too (pun intended), but life doesn't work like that. We can't have it both ways. Will we choose to clear the blockages that prevent the full circulation of the Holy Spirit or live our lives on a dead-end spiritual trajectory? Will we choose to reinvest ourselves in the life of Jesus, so that with his help, we rediscover the forgiveness, love, joy and peace that create in us a new and wonderful identity, one that fulfills our purpose in a way that's far greater than anything we can ever ask for or imagine? May our daily spiritual exercise regimen open us to the flow of grace given to reorient us to God's presence, which fills all things both in and around us.

## What is "The Faith" of the Episcopal Church?

The Faith taught by the Episcopal Church is none other than the Apostolic Christian Faith. No more and no less. Nothing taught by Anglicans is peculiar to Anglicanism. All teachings are those of the ancient and undivided Church. Christian doctrine (i.e. teaching), as taught by Anglicans, must conform to three criteria: Scripture, Tradition, and Reason. No doctrine can be taught which is not at the same time scriptural, traditional, and reasonable. Episcopalians must therefore know the Bible, and the traditions and history of the Church. Especially important to Episcopalians is the Bible. No Episcopal priest may teach unbiblical doctrine, and no Episcopalian is required to believe anything as necessary for salvation except what is contained in Holy Scripture. This is the Faith that has been handed down to us through the ages.

## A PRAYER FOR GENERAL CONVENTION

General Convention is the Triennial meeting of the Episcopal Church, consisting of all our bishops, and our elected Clergy and Lay Deputies from each diocese, who will meet July 5-13 in Austin, Texas to deliberate topics, from which critically important decisions will be made affecting the Church's life, many of which are highly controversial, and potentially divisive. From now through the end of General Convention, please pray daily the prayer below for divine wisdom, discernment and the unity and health of the Church.

Almighty and gracious God, as we prepare for General Convention in Austin, have mercy on your church, troubled and divided. Pour out your heavenly blessings; redeem, restore and remold your church until we are made new, that we may be one in Christ for the sake of the world. Instill within the Bishops and Deputies humble hearts and discerning minds that hunger and thirst for your righteousness and justice, and your vision for our future. Through the decisions and spirit of this General Convention, renew in the whole church a passionate longing for you Lord Jesus and for the coming of your kingdom. Unite us in one mission: to reach out and make new disciples of Jesus for God's Kingdom and the transformation of the world in and through the power and love of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

## FR. RANDY'S RAVE REVIEWS: BOOKS TO BUY, BEG OR BORROW:

### WHY?: Making Sense of God's Will

(By Adam Hamilton, Abingdon Press ©2018, \$11.04)

HIGHLY RECOMMENDED.

This little book, Why? is short and easy to read and filled with interesting stories. Adam Hamilton, a Methodist pastor, brings fresh insight to the age-old question of how to understand the will of God. Where is God when tragedy and suffering strike? When the ground shakes, and a poor nation's economy is destroyed; when the waters rise, washing away a community's hopes and dreams; when a child suffers neglect and abuse; when violence tears apart nations where is God? If God is all powerful, and if each one of us is a beloved child of God, then how can God allow tragedy and suffering to mar his creation? Rejecting simplistic answers and unexamined assumptions, he lays out core ideas for comprehending God's plan for the world, including: God will not take away our free will even when we use it to grieve him. God will never abandon us, especially in the midst of our suffering. While God is not the author of suffering, God will bring blessing out of tragedy.

## THE WILL OF GOD

*By Leslie Weatherhead, Abingdon Press, ©1999, \$7.19 on Amazon*  
**HIGHLY RECOMMENDED.**

This little book is short and easy to read. I referenced it during our Bible study classes recently. Its original context was 5 sermons written by a pastor to help his congregation better understand the will of God as religious doubt arose seeing their city and church crumble around them. During the tumultuous era of World War II, the city of London was shattered under unrelenting bombs dropped by Nazi Germany. Millions of buildings were destroyed or damaged, tens of thousands of civilians were killed, and survivors were left to ask: How can this destruction be part of God's plan? What is God's will in all of this?

Weatherhead's sermons were eventually published as *The Will of God*, a resource that has sold more than a million copies and has been a lifeline for grieving persons seeking to understand God's purpose for their pain. He basically breaks down God's Will into 3 categories: Intentional, Circumstantial and Ultimate. This newly revised edition includes background information and photos of the historic setting that inspired the book, and a new cover and layout to refresh a timeless message, both for new and returning readers.

## GOOD GRIEF: 50<sup>TH</sup> Anniversary Edition

*(By Granger E. Westberg, Fortress Press, ©2010, \$5.99 on Amazon)*  
**HIGHLY RECOMMENDED.**

This little book is short and easy to read. It more than survived the test of time. For 58 years now Good Grief has helped millions of readers find comfort and rediscover hope after loss. This new edition includes a foreword by one of the leading communicators of medical health care information, and an afterword by the author's daughters tells how the book came to be.

Good Grief identifies ten stages of grief--shock, emotion, depression, physical distress, panic, guilt, anger, resistance, hope, and acceptance but, recognizing that grief is complex and deeply personal, defines no "right" way to grieve. Good Grief offers valuable insights on the emotional and physical responses persons may experience during the natural process of grieving. The anniversary gift edition includes space for readers to record thoughts about their personal experience with grief. Whether mourning the death of a loved one, the end of a marriage, the loss of a job, or other difficult life changes, Good Grief is a proven steady companion in times of loss.

## WHEN THERE IS NO MIRACLE: Finding Hope In Pain and Suffering

(By Robert Wise, Kregal Publications, ©2016, \$15)

**HIGHLY RECOMMENDED**

The book in no way denies that healing happens and miracles do occur as a result of prayer. But rather it addresses the reality that very often they don't...at least in the way we hope as we pray. People of faith often tend to rationalize or deny that this is true, but it is. It doesn't mean that prayers are ineffective or that God is absent, yet it is a difficult thing for even the most faithful Christian to process. This book is filled with stories, Godly wisdom and helpful insights that every Christian will find edifying, especially if you or a person you love has been struck with tragedy and you're stuck with the burning question of "Why doesn't God do something?"

## **HOW TO COMMEMORATE ELVIS' DEATH**

**(A Satire Just for Fun)**  
**(January 8, 1935 - August 16, 1977)**

I decided to include this since this is the July-August newsletter and Elvis died on August 16. A priest friend of mine who knows I'm a HUGE Elvis fan, sent me an important question a couple of years ago near that day. That's the one where all the stops are pulled, lit up Elvis trees decorate homes, and gifts are exchanged, usually Elvis recordings. Nothing is more sacred of course than an Elvis recording. I hope this has been a meaningful and rewarding explanation to your noble question. I'll be crying in the chapel because I'll know that you are the devil in disguise, and that now and then, there's a fool such as you. But there's no need to be lonesome tonight. I hope and pray you never forget to remember to forget all your prejudices, and that you will look to St. Elvis this day and say, "I want you, I need you, I love you...more and more." ## HOPE AND HEALING HAPPEN...EVEN WHEN THEY DON'T

Some thoughts on the phrase: "Nothing is impossible with God" (Luke 1:37): It's a key line in Gabriel's message to Mary, obviously referring to her unique and surprising pregnancy by God's initiative, as well as Mary's elder cousin Elizabeth's unexpected and extraordinary pregnancy well past her childbearing years (two miraculous events from both ends of the age spectrum). But most of the time when we use that phrase, we think of God's capacity to dramatically change the status of our poor health or negative personal circumstances, when we've had no success in doing so ourselves. God certainly can do this, and sometimes does. But I'm reminded of Paul's heartfelt plea to God on 3 different occasions to remove whatever that thorn was in his side (2 Corinthians 12:7-10). It never happened, but God does the impossible anyway. He tells Paul that his (God's) grace is sufficient for him (Paul), and that God's strength is made perfect through Paul's weakness. God seems to want that "thorn" to be perceived as a kind of spiritual "gift." The Lord's ways are always mysterious, surprising and unexpected.

Bishop N.T. Wright writes in *Simply Good News*: "*Jesus doesn't explain why there is suffering, illness, and death in the world. He brings healing and hope. He doesn't allow the problem of evil to be the subject of a seminar. He allows evil to do its worst to him. He exhausts it, drains its power, and emerges with new life.*" Jesus brings healing and hope, but not always in the way we expect or desire. Suffering is a hard thing to bear; it even seems impossible to bear at times. But God can overcome the impossible. Sometimes we're healed of our physical or emotional malady, or our painful situation. But more often God provides the grace that changes something in us that gives us the courage, strength and perseverance to overcome the strain of the issue or circumstance that grieves us. As difficult as it is to understand, and even harder to appreciate, the hardship itself very often becomes the catalyst for closer communion with God. And that's really the whole point of life, isn't it?

## THE INVOCATION OF SAINTS

The invocation of saints has been practiced since the early centuries of the church and never been prohibited. But a misunderstanding of what that means has created apprehension among some. The invocation of Saints is often incorrectly perceived as praying TO the saint rather than to God. The truth is that we are simply asking a saint of antiquity (baptized Christian) or one who we love but see no longer (they are both alive in Christ, even in death), to pray to the Lord on our behalf, just as we ask our friends to pray for us, as prayer partners.

Is it necessary? No. Is it permitted? The doctrine of the Communion of Saints means that love and prayer never cease on either side of death...that is, we're still very much in relationship with one another. We are not permitted to worship anyone but God, and we are not permitted to have a séance to communicate with dead spirits. Asking prayers of the faithful departed involves no visions or conversations. Can they hear our requests? We don't know. But if we are all alive in Christ (living and dead), it only makes sense that we intercede for one another from both sides of this life, although they are presently closer to Jesus than we are.

Who is closer to Jesus than his mother, the Blessed Virgin Mary? We know she has influence with her son from the story of Jesus turning water into wine at the wedding in Cana of Galilee (John 2:1-12). There is a certain degree of speculation involved when we try to understand how specific we can be in knowing how this all works. All I can say is that the practice of asking for the prayers of those who are alive in Christ but dead to this world, has been done by the same Church who gave us the Bible, even before the New Testament was acknowledged as scripture.
