Fr. Randy's Rambling Ruminations:



HOPE AND HEALING HAPPEN... EVEN WHEN THEY DON'T

Some thoughts on the phrase: "Nothing is impossible with God" (Luke 1:37): It's a key line in Gabriel's message to Mary, obviously referring to her unique and surprising pregnancy by God's initiative, as well as Mary's elder cousin Elizabeth's unexpected and extraordinary pregnancy well past her childbearing years (two miraculous events from both ends of the age spectrum). But most of the time when we use that phrase, we think of God's capacity to dramatically change the status of our poor health or negative personal circumstances, when we've had no success in doing so ourselves. God certainly can do this, and sometimes does. But I'm reminded of Paul's heartfelt plea to God on 3 different occasions to remove whatever that thorn was in his side (2 Corinthians 12:7-10). It never happened, but God does the impossible anyway. The Lord tells Paul that his (God's) grace is sufficient for him (Paul), and that God's strength is made perfect through Paul's weakness. God seems to want that "thorn" to be perceived as a kind of spiritual "gift." The Lord's ways are always mysterious, surprising and unexpected.

Bishop N.T. Wright writes in *Simply Good News*: "*Jesus doesn't explain why there is suffering, illness, and death in the world. He brings healing and hope. He doesn't allow the problem of evil to be the subject of a seminar. He allows evil to do its worst to him. He exhausts it, drains its power, and emerges with new life.*" Jesus brings healing and hope, but not always in the way we expect or desire. Suffering is a hard thing to bear; it even seems impossible to bear at times.

But God can overcome the impossible. Sometimes we're healed of our physical or emotional malady, or our painful situation. But more often God provides the grace that changes something in us that gives us the courage, strength and perseverance to overcome the strain of the issue or circumstance that grieves us. As difficult as it is to understand, and even harder to appreciate, the hardship itself very often becomes the catalyst for closer communion with God. And that's really the whole point of life, isn't it?

As was stated in the last newsletter, the vestry is developing a plan for St. James to engage in several evangelism initiatives over the next year to help us cultivate a growing awareness and increased comfort level in learning how to share our faith more effectively as a way of life. Here is a review of the offerings we currently have on the table.

- Evangelism 101 class on "The 9 Arts of Spiritual Conversations" (This class is currently running through the summer on Thursdays at 1 PM.
- Praise & Worship with catered Barbecue and guest speaker tentatively scheduled for Sunday, November 17, at 5 PM. OPEN INVITATION to friends and neighbors!
- 2020 Parish-wide REVIVAL; Tentatively 2nd weekend of February (7th-9th). OPEN INVITATION! (Prayer preparation to precede it).
- Carrie Headington, our Canon for Diocesan Evangelism, will come and share teaching on "Sharing Our Faith as a Way of Life" (either in Lent or Easter of 2020)
- Overall--Cultivating a mindfulness/awareness of God's presence everywhere at all times--Learning to see how God is at work in our life and the lives of others--Looking for God rather than negativity.

Safeguarding God's Children and Sexual Harassment Prevention Training

Required for Some / Available to ALL

I remember when this training was implemented in the Diocese of Dallas some 30 years ago. Our Suffragan Bishop, Bruce MacPherson, was instrumental in making it a Church-wide requirement for the Episcopal Church. Its purpose is to minimize, and hopefully prevent, the prevalence of sexual scandals in our church that have been experienced in many other parts of Christ's Body. Protecting children and eliminating sexual harassment are uppermost concerns.

This training is required for those involved in some forms of parish ministry not only for the protection of children and adults from potential sexual abuse or harassment, but to protect those who are in ministry roles from being in situations where they may be falsely accused. Like it or not, this is our reality in today's world. As a priest, I'm required to retake the training every 5 years. And if I change dioceses, it's required again, even if I just completed it. Background checks are also required for all priests and for those working with children in Sunday School or nursery settings. Not only that, but the training helps us to recognize the signs when something is not right that might put a child or adult at risk, and how to go about reporting it. This can be useful to know in settings outside of the Church, as well as within.

Fortunately, the training modules can be completed at home on your computer, like a defensive driving course. But for those who choose not to do it that way, I will be teaching the required content sometime toward the end of August at a day and time to be determined. It may take two afternoons because 7 hours of instruction are required. I want to give those who have not completed the training via computer the opportunity to do so. If you find the technology too difficult, there are people willing to assist you. I'll hook you up with one of them if you ask.

All vestry, key-holders, Sunday school and nursery ministry workers are required to complete the training. *Note: There are no nursery/Sunday school ministers scheduled on the ministry schedule for the rest of the summer since there are not at least two people currently trained. Sunday school/nursery require two people at all times. When we have an adequate number trained, we will reschedule.* Those who still need to complete this will receive an email from me in the next week or so. Anyone who is NOT required to complete the training, and would like to do it, please contact Bonnie Dill, and she'll set you up with the computer link. Please know that requiring this training of you is not personal in any way. We all have to do it depending on our access to vulnerable people. If you have questions or concerns, please contact Bonnie or me.

Summer is a time for fun...so there's this...

"HOW TO COMMEMORATE ELVIS' DEATH"

(Nativity date: January 8, 1935 - Dormition date: August 16, 1977)
